## Nature of support 2013/14

A proportion of the PPG was used to fund the position of Community Support Manager (CSM) in our school. Children received additional support from the Community Support manager to help them overcome barriers to their learning. For some children this may also have involved working with parents to help with engagement in learning. The CSM was also involved with tracking children and families who found attendance an issue.

Children worked in small groups for literacy and numeracy, sometimes this was with a learning support assistant and for other situations teachers worked with very small groups. In classes children will have received some 1:1 support as and when necessary, especially in the upper school. Children in upper key stage 2 have regular meeting with their teachers to help them achieve the best they can.

Science outreach activities were also offered to all children so that science learning could be put into context. This forms part of our curriculum enrichment activities. A number of children in key stage 2 who demonstrate an aptitude for logical thinking take part in chess for an hour each week. They are also offered the opportunity to take part in competitions. In this group 25% of children have been supported by the PPG.

Homework clubs have been included in our extracurricular opportunities. The clubs are offered to all children and in the year 13/14 39% of the extra curricular uptake was by children who are supported by PPG. Contributions are made from the PPG for residential visits and other enhanced learning opportunities.

A contribution has been made to computer hardware to enable children to have access to IT in school and opportunities are provided for them to do this.(this included ipads and ipods)

A contribution to music tuition has been made from the grant. The 25% of the school band has been supported by the PPG. Some children in receipt of PPG have small group music lessons, these children have been identified as being talented.

## Curriculum focus of PPG spending 2013/14

Ensuring effective feedback on learning. All class teachers had as part of their planning and assessment time an opportunity to talk individually to children about their learning. All children have a learning journal in KS1 and KS2 which included age appropriate reflections on their learning.

All children in KS1 and Early Years are taught phonics, through Letters and Sounds. This involves a large number of staff as children are taught in small groups. This supports the developments of early reading skills. Children are supported in small groups to enhance their learning. It is expected, in 14/15 that by the end of the autumn term the vast majority of children in KS1 will be on stage 5 of the letters and sounds programme to enable them to fully access the phonics text in June..

Children who fell behind were taught in small groups to fill the gaps. A comprehensive tracking system is developed to ensure that children's progress is tracked effectively at classroom level. Children who were underachieving were directed into a targeted small group. This would sometimes



result in 1:1 support and sometimes work would be carried out in small groups led by either a teacher or a support assistant.

## Measuring the impact of PPG spending
